



This year's Fish Rock Adventure was a very wet one. SAGs were much appreciated in this race as the rain made for a cold ride and SAG vehicles became a welcome respite from the chilly weather.

From Comm Boss, Fred AE6SF: Hi Fish Rock Hams,

Thank you for working the event yesterday. I hope you found it as fulfilling as I did. I think we did an outstanding job of providing effective communications over difficult terrain, and clearly contributed to the well-being of the riders during this event. The

event had a delayed start due to snow and slush at the summit, and the cold weather pounded the riders with rain at times, causing some riders to bail early, and some to potentially suffer from hypothermia. Thank you station ops for sheltering cold riders, and thank you SAGs for moving riders along the course, and at the end of the event, into Finish. Having riders on 128 after dark would have been a potentially dangerous situation. One late rider told me he (as were others) was required to be sagged into Finish and became thankful once he saw the climb back into town that he would have had to make. Thanks to all who stayed late as needed, and thanks to the MOTOs who contributed situational awareness as well as aided cyclists.

Here's a shout out to our shadows. You participated and got your feet wet. I heard you all on the air. Well done. Please come back for more.


Greetings. The March Technician License Class was a success with all students earning licenses. Kudos to the five instructors and multiple VEs

Digital Mobile Radio Sonoma County Talk Group 31707!

The club's DMR footprint continues to expand! We established a beachhead on DMR and the BrandMeister network of repeaters and hotspots by adding a talk group for Sonoma County! We are using talk group number 31707 to keep in touch on DMR and be able to discuss local news and topics of interest. The use of a talk group like 31707 allows a wider variety of Sonoma County DMR hams to be able to consistently reach each other on the air. Best of all, the 31707 talk group can be reached on hotspots as well as repeaters, meaning you can tie into your local community wherever you are!

We also started a DMR net for Sonoma County (using talk group 31707) that lets us practice a little bit of traffic handling, while also allowing us to get together and talk about ways we can integrate DMR into our normal operating habits! Currently Randy AA6RH runs net control, and it's scheduled ahead of the "Sonoma County EmComm Net Crawl" on Monday evenings. If you have a DMR radio, make sure to program it (or ask Randy to help you program it) to include talk group 31707 on any of the area DMR repeaters (there are at least four in Sonoma County!) and join us on Monday evenings!

CONTEST CORNER

Welcome to April and this month's edition of Contest Corner.

Let's begin with a look ahead to the first weekend in May and mention a few contests that we don't want to miss. The 10-10 International Spring Contest, CW is there with marginal conditions yet giving us an opportunity to maybe work a few stations on 10m at this time with a declining solar cycle. FISTS has their Spring Slow Speed Sprint and all cw ops or those interested are encouraged to join in or at least listen in. It is another great learning opportunity. Delaware and Indiana have their state QSO parties and the 7th Call Area does as well. Wrapping up the first weekend in May is the venerable New England QSO Party, another popular Coast to Coast challenge.

The month of April has eight state QSO parties, nearly as many Qrp contests, and two State Parks on the Air, Florida and Texas. The 14th will bring the ARRL Rookie Roundup, SSB. For some of you who have been hesitant to get on the air with HF give some consideration to this contest for new hams. Rookies can work everyone and nonrookies only work rookies.

As with all contests the better you prepare the better the outcome. Your station is the means by which you will be utilizing your skills while contesting so make an effort to improve it every chance you get. Being part of a team or merely competing with another partner can bring added excitement and fulfillment to the experience. Learn to recognize the good and not so good operators so you can improve your on the air exposure. Also make sure you read the contest rules prior to "show time" and get the exchange down pat. Above all, find out what you like about contesting and have fun.

It is 50 feet around the loop made of window line which makes 2 turns and a tuning stub. You need an antenna analyzer to adjust, that will tell you impedance as you will tune to minimum impedance at the end of the coupler lines. As a diamond, it is 18' by 18' You can replace tuning stub with capacitor to enable tuning.



Field Day – Let's Show the Public What Amateur Radio is All About

When the ARRL proclaimed the first "International Field Day" in 1933, the purpose given was: "Besides offering an opportunity to get out in the open in this fine spring weather, the real object of this contest is to test "portables" wherever they may be available. If successful we want to make it an annual affair."

Nowadays, Field Day is on the fourth full weekend in June. So this year it will be June 22 and June 23.

But it is still a means of testing our ability to operate at sites away from our normal stations and working "off the grid".

Perhaps most importantly, however, it gives us a chance to demonstrate these capabilities to the general public.

On top of all that, it gives us a chance to socialize. We can even camp out on Saturday night.

Which brings us to Field Day 2019. Although June 22/23 may seem like a ways off, we've already had our first planning meeting and we have two more scheduled. Our next Field Day Planning Meeting will be Saturday, April 20, from 10:00am to 11:30am, at the Field Day site, Youth Community Park, 1725 Fulton Road, Santa Rosa (across the road from Piner High School). If you are interested in any aspect of Field Day, please join us. Bring your own chair.

We have already found leaders for many of the volunteers positions, but there are still several more to be filled. Check out the Field Day website for the complete list (http://sonomacountyradioamateurs.com/wp/events/field-day/). You don't have to be a seasoned ham to be eligible. This is an event for all hams, regardless of skill level, to learn how to setup and operate HF and VHF stations in the field.

There will also be an Educational Activity on Saturday, June 22, at 3pm. We will be building 2m groundplane antennas. The antenna design is the same basic one as we did a few years ago, but this version includes a

We plan on having four HF stations: SSB, CW, Digital, and GOTA

The GOTA station will be operating from solar power exclusively.

We also plan on making a satellite contact.

We also plan on holding an Exam Session on Saturday, June 22, starting about noon or 12:30 pm and being done by 2:30pm.

This year we are also hoping to staff a "Tech Bench" where hams can come and get some help on things such as how to install Anderson Power Poles, simple radio checks, and mobile antenna installation checks. If you think you could help in this area, please let me know.

As you can see, Field Day is an event-packed weekend. If you are looking to learn something, anything, about amateur radio, this will be the weekend to do it.

If you can make it to our next planning meeting on Saturday, April 20 at 10am, wonderful. If you can't make it, please send me an e-mail with any suggestions you may have or how you think you can help.

Answer: CQD is one of the first distress signals adopted for radio use prior to SOS. It was established on February 1, 1904 by the Marconi International Marine Communication Company. "CQD" was understood by wireless operators to mean, "All stations: distress." On April 15, 1912, RMS Titanic radio operator Jack Phillips initially sent "CQD", which was still commonly used by British ships. Harold Bride, the junior radio operator, suggested using "SOS", saying half-jokingly that it might be his last chance to use the new code. Phillips thereafter began to alternate between the two. Though Bride survived the sinking, Phillips did not.
