



I would like to thank all of you who took part in the April 6 drill. It was by far the biggest RACES participation in a countywide drill. The county was very impressed, and any doubt about the RACES readiness was set to rest. I think you will also be impressed when you see the numbers that follow. We had a total of 74 operators at 46 locations. There were 7 EOC'S covered, 6 hospitals and 7 packet stations. We passed 333 messages in two and a half hours and volunteered about 520 hours of time.

There have been two critiques with input from 29 operators. Even though we did an outstanding job, there is always room for improvement, especially in the message-passing department.

In a real major earthquake we can expect our repeater to be off the air; this is the reason we ran so much of the drill on simplex. Simplex caused us some problems as we expected, but we did pretty good with what we had. Sonoma and Petaluma EOC'S were unable to talk to the county EOC, but hopefully this will cause some actions to be taken that will help our simplex coverage.

The SCRA repeater worked very good from it's new location in Sebastopol. It covered the county pretty good and even got a S-9 report from Vallejo. Thanks to Jim N6PTM who donated the location and Jack KB6LWV for helping with installation, and Hank for the loan of a UHF antenna. The SCRA repeater will continue to be available for emergency service.

Our tactical and packet nets were jammed with traffic. This was good to see and hard to deal with, but in a real emergency we don't foresee this much traffic in such a short amount of time. Our packet message form will be updated as a result of the drill.

EDITORIAL: YET ANOTHER NO-CODE LETTER



In April OST, OM Harry Helms AA6FW claims that the code license has never acted as a "filter" to screen out undesirables. For proof, he tells us to listen to 75 meters or some of our 2-meter repeaters. On the same page, Bob Locher W9KNI claims that "in spite of initial reservations by many amateurs" at the time the Novice license was introduced, the result has been a net benefit to amateur radio.

Is amateur radio better today because of the Novice license? I believe the answer is not so clear. Our numbers have increased since the entrance standards were lowered. The CB boom of the 60's & 70's brought in many ex-CB'ers who had become disenchanted with the chaos on "chicken band." Many of these folks have become fine amateurs. Others have either dropped out due to lack of interest, or turned into those 75 meter loonies or repeater jammers mentioned by AA6FW.

Whatever disadvantages it may have, the CW exam does act as a filter. The question is, how fine a filter do we want? The looser the screen, the more chaff gets through with the wheat.

I might be persuaded to go along with a codeless license if I were confident the written exam would remain tough enough to act as the filter. Unfortunately, over the course of time, license requirements tend to ease, and privileges tend to increase. When I took the Novice exam (1968), the license term was for one year only, non-renewable. Power input was limited to 75 Watts, crystal control (no VFO). There were three HF Novice bands, 80, 40 and 15 meters, (CW only of course). The code exam required 1 minute of solid copy without error. I recall the written exam as being harder also -- I understand that the present Novice syllabus does not even cover Ohm's law.

I think we're barking up the wrong tree. Novice enhancement has not brought in many new hams. No amount of tinkering with the FCC regulations will cause hordes of high-

quality candidates to beat down our doors. If people are truly fascinated with the hobby, the Novice code and written exams will not stop them. We must find ways to stimulate that interest if we are ever to attract the type of people who will be a credit to amateur radio.


ARE YOU SOMEBODY ELSE?

NEW PACKET BBS

SONOMA COUNTY HAS ITS FIRST FULL-FEATURED PACKET BULLETIN BOARD SYSTEM ON THE AIR:

The KB6GOZ PBBS at the Two Rock Coast Guard Training Center is a PC-based system with tie-in to the Westnet system that forwards messages anywhere in the country. Frequency is 144.97 MHz with a gateway to 14.107, so you can work packet DX with your 2M rig!

Just CONNECT to KB6GOZ. At the prompt, you can enter "H" to get the following Help:

"For help on a specific command, enter H x where x is the command for which you wish help. For example, H R will give help for the READ command. Optional fields of the commands are shown inside "[]"

ARRL COMMITTEE PROPOSES NO-CODE LICENSE. A new basic Technician class would have all bands/modes above 50 MHz, except packet only on two meters. The written exam would be somewhat harder than the Tech. Special callsigns (possibly from the "NA" group) would be issued. Details are in May OST.

FCC HAS DENIED TWO PETITIONS. W2FJ's would have allowed SSB on the 30 meter band. N6QQQ wanted to allow Technicians to use packet in the 80, 40 and 15 meter Novice bands. (Tnx Westlink Report)

MACC SAYS NO! The Mid-America Coordination Council won't release confidential repeater data to ARRL Repeater Coordinators' Database due to security concerns. This essentially kills the concept of a national coordination framework administered by ARRL. MACC will continue to provide repeater listings to the Repeater Directory. (Tnx Westlink Report)

ALL ABOUT ELECTRICITY


- I have been fiddlin' with electricity for 50 years! While I'm still able, I'd like to pass along some of my vast knowledge about this stuff.
- 1 Electricity is manufactured in power plants where it is fed into wires and wrapped around large drums that hang on poles.
- 2. Some electricity does not need to go through wires, like that used for lightning, for example, and portable radios. This kind of electricity is not manufactured, but just hangs around in the air, loose.
- 3. Electricity makes a low humming noise. This noise may be pitched differently for use in telephones, doorbells and electric organs.
- 4. Electricity must be grounded before it can function -- except in airplanes, which have their own arrangements.
- 5_ Although electricity does not leak out of an empty socket, if you put your finger in the socket, you can tell it's there. So if it is not leaking out, what else is it doing?
- 6. Electricity is made of two ingredients, negative and positive. One ingredient travels along a wire covered with white plastic, the other ingredient along a wire covered with black plastic. These two wires connect to a device called a plug. There the two ingredients are mixed to form electricity.
- 7- Electricity may be stored in boxes, called batteries. Big batteries do not necessarily hold more electricity than small ones. In big batteries, the electricity is showeled in, while in small batteries, it is packed in flat.
- 8. The electric switch contains a sort of vise grip that squeezes the wire very hard so the electricity can't get through.

 Opening (turning "on") the switch releases the vise grip, and the electricity can flow.

- 9. Electricity goes into a light bulb where for the first time we can see it! It is enlarged many times by the curvature of the bulb, which is made of magnifying glass.
- 10. Why does the light bulb blow out? 'Cause as any schoolboy knows, heat converts oxygen into moisture. When all the oxygen in the bulb becomes moisture, then the water quenches the spark.
- 11. Colored electricity lights red and green bulbs and stoplights.
- 12. Negative electricity runs refrigerators.
- 13. Some people who don't understand electricity wire their fuseboxes to hold little glass things with fuse wire in them. I find chicken wire better, and it won't blow out, even if the dryer goes up in flames.

Despite all this vast knowledge, I still don't understand a few things about electricity, like how a computer that speaks English can be programmed to speak French, which is a different voltage? Also neon signs are a mystery. How is the electricity trained to spell out things? How does the electricity know when the toast is ready?

UPGRADES since the last meeting are KC6CAJ/AA and KB6LWV/KT.

The MINUTES from last month were approved as printed in Short Skip. m/s N6PTM/W6TLK

The TREASURER'S REPORT by N6PTM was approved and shows \$1001.41 in the General Fund and \$1981.65 in the Repeater Fund as of March 31. m/s N6DDK/WA6ACX

PUBLIC SERVICE EVENTS will total 5 next month. April 16 is the Crop Walk for world hunger. On the 23'rd the Coddingtown Lions Club sponsors a 3-in-1 race. Two events need our help on April 29: The March of Dimes WalkAmerica and the Special Olympics at the JC. The week after we do the Mucky Moodoo event in support of a local school.
