



Transmitter Hunt

All you transmitter "fox" hunters, mark your calendars for Saturday, October 16. That's the date of the club's 2 meter transmitter hunt. This year a special surprise will await all participants at the hidden transmitter site. All hunters please sign up for the event at the club meeting on October 6, or contact John Breckenridge at 838-6398. We'll give a brief explanation of transmitter hunting at the October meeting.

Those of you who have never "hunted down" a hidden transmitter should give it a try! You don't need expensive equipment, and you can build a good directional 2 meter antenna with a minimum of effort. If you don't have a 2 meter receiver, fox hunters usually need at least one other person to help with the hunt, anyway. Perhaps you can work out a partnership.

Here's how we will run the hunt: The transmitter will be located within 7 miles of Piner High School. We don't want anybody being a threat on our public highways, so how quickly you can locate the fox will NOT matter. Everyone should have found it within three hours, or we will TELL you where we are. The winner will find the fox in the least amount of MILES, and will enjoy the following:

- * Envy and respect from all other participants
- * Recognition in the November issue of the "Short Skip"
- * The privilege of being the "fox" next year to carry on the tradition

and most importantly,

* Being able to tell everyone you meet that you're a fox

On Saturday the 16th, hunters will assemble in the Piner High School parking lot for a short briefing and to clock vehicle, bicycle, or skateboard odometers before the hunt begins. Don't laugh. Last year, Doug, KC6RHA found the fox while riding a bicycle and WITHOUT a radio!

DXing in the Attic

Not long ago, my interest in amateur radio advanced from 2 meters to High Frequency. Don't get me wrong, I still take my Handie Talkie to bed with me at night but the prospect of transcontinental rag chewing gets my heart pumping! Small problem, however: I live in an antenna-repressive neighborhood on a lot that is about fifty feet square. Here, the CC & R simplifies antenna regulations with one rule: you can't have one. At the mere mention of an antenna, our architectural review committee would convene a posse with a hanging rope while the rest of the neighborhood circles the barbecue grills to watch me twist and kick in the wind. "Hot Dang, Martha, just look at old Mike dangle."

While some of my friends and fellow club members are currently struggling with unsympathetic neighbors and bureaucratic local governments (redundancy), I sought the path less traveled.

Experiment Number One: Dipole in the Dining Room

The installation is easy. With an SO-239, some carefully measured copper wire and a couple of thumb tacks, you're in business and on the air. I couldn't believe it! After calling CQ for 10 seconds, I had a 59 signal report from the state of Illinois. Several QSO's later, I discovered that my wife is even less understanding than the Santa Rosa Building Department. Well, I can't blame her. When you have guests for dinner and they get hung up on the 20 meter dipole strung from the china cabinet to the chandelier, even the most understanding of wives is likely to become a little testy.

Experiment Number Two: Dipole in the Attic

It occurred to me that if I relocated the dipole from the dining room to the attic, not only would reception improve, but my marriage might as well. And I was right! I immediately experienced a 3 dB gain in marital relations. Meantime, I began racking up states for my "Worked All States" attempt like crazy.

Though I wasn't trying, the countries started piling up as well. Germany, Russia, Korea, Australia and many others gave strong reports. Japanese stations were as common as 2 meter repeater contacts. I even worked a Japanese QRP station that was 25 watts on SSB! As of this writing, I have worked all 50 states and am waiting for my contact in Alabama to cough up the last QSL card. I must be patient, as I have only sent him three SASE's so far.

I've got to tell you that it is mighty gratifying to cut through a DX pileup running barefoot on an antenna that cost less than five bucks. You don't need a 2 KW amplifier and a four element Yagi at 75 feet to run with the big dogs. All that is required is a little persistence and the occasional good conditions.

DO Try This at Home:

Here are some tips for installing a dipole in the attic. I found that a single strand dipole dedicated for an individual band worked best. Fan (multi-band) dipoles do not give as good reports. If you have a metal roof, sell your house and buy one with a wood shake or asphalt shingle roof. Test the dipole in the hallway before climbing into the attic with it. If possible, orient the dipole for an east-west broadside. When in the attic, try to step on the roof trusses. The quickest way to get out of the attic is to stand on wall board.

Take the cordless phone with you into the attic because all of your miserable friends and family have extrasensory perception and will call at the moment you are farthest in. If you aren't crazy about spiders, stick with the dipole in the dining room. In my case, the spiders offered less resistance than the XYL. Stay as far away from electrical house wiring as possible. Pick a cool day. If when trying to exit the attic, you kick the ladder out from under yourself, remember the cordless phone and call a friend over to help you out. Don't plan on using a linear amplifier unless you have excellent health insurance for your family and don't mind hair loss or bleeding from the aums.

The main purpose of a dipole in the attic is stealth. I have adopted the "Don't ask, Don't tell" theorem of amateur radio. Since I am not experiencing RFI or TVI, it is only fair to assume that I am not causing any for my

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neighbors. However, if you choose to announce your activities, be assured that when Fran's dishwasher is leaving spots on the glasses or Murray's Siamese cat develops hairballs, that they will blame you. Of course, when the Big Earthquake comes and they want to get a Health & Welfare message out to their Aunt Minnie in Wisconsin, all is forgiven (for a least a week).

Experiment Number Three: The Cushcraft R7 in the Attic

The first thing to remember is that you should not assemble the R7 until you are in the attic. Secondly, go to the hardware store and buy lots of extra hardware for when you drop screws and nuts into the fluffy insulation. Don't stop to look for pieces that you drop. I have tried it and have discovered that these pieces go into another dimension. In the attic, you can swap the safety harness for a fanny pack. Unless your attic is a lot taller than mine, plan on mounting the antenna as diagonally as possible. Suspend it with cotton clothesline rope. During QSO'S, tell people that you have an R7 Diagonal; that'll keep them guessing. The angle of radiation is a little strange but it works. Talk about taking the short path; this short path is straight through the earth but somehow, some of it gets over the horizon. Maybe I will try a multi-element Yagi in the attic another time.

Just remember — you don't need an antenna orchard in the middle of forty acres to enjoy the low bands. And you don't need to spend a million bucks. There are some great bargains to be had on HF equipment if you make an effort to shop around the packet BBS, listen to the 2 meter Tuesday net, read Short Skip and visit a couple of swap meets. If I told you about all the bargains I scored at the SCRA Swap Meet last year, it would only make you mad!
