# President's Message

#### SCRA versus NARCC-The Final Chapter

Well it has been a long time coming, but allow me a brief summary. I came to the Santa Rosa area some four years ago and I was looking for

an Amateur Radio Club. Somehow, I don't recall how, I came across this one, and after attending a few meetings I paid my dues and joined the group. It wasn't long before I found that all was not well. Apparently a big battle had been brewing with the County of Sonoma and subsequently, with NARCC. Things came to a head when after being declined coordination, a lawsuit was filed against NARCC. I will go no further than to say that things got very ugly and contentious. In December of 2005 I ran for the Office of President of SCRA with the intent of accomplishing four things. The first was to establish an improved relationship with NARCC that would lead to granting of coordination of our repeater. The second was help affect positive changes in NARCC's rules and procedures. The third was to drop the lawsuit against NARCC and the fourth was to extend a friendly hand to those parties who had become estranged from SCRA.

At the end of the first year as President of your club I had not yet accomplished these goals. I had managed to make contact with key people within NARCC, I had presented them, a few proposed changes to their Rules and Procedures. I had also made personal contact with the Clark Murphy, the President of Santa Clara Amateur Radio Association (SCARA). SCARA was the operator of W6UU, the repeater in San Jose that used the same frequency as SCRA. There were reportedly incidents of

SCRA interfering with SCARA. Until NARCC helped us find a usable frequency pair, it seemed that we might have to share the 146.985 Mhz frequency pair with them. I felt that it was imperative that if no alternatives werefound, that we should be on friendly terms with SCARA. At the end of my first year in office it was clear that the goals I had set were not going to be met within my expected time frame. This is why I ran for a second term as your President.

I am now very pleased to announce that all four goals have been met. We have established an excellent relationship with NARCC and we have been granted Coordination on our new frequency, 147.315 Mhz. With the next week we will be drawing up official papers that will remove the objection filed against the coordination of SCARA's coordination on 146.985 Mhz. In addition we will withdraw our lawsuit against NARCC and receive from them an agreement to change certain Rules and Procedures. And lastly, I will have completed my efforts at extending a friendly hand to those involved in the original dispute. I am not offering apologies or explanations, but I have publicly stated that it is time for us to set aside our past disputes and to move on in a friendly way. More than this I cannot do.

I wish to publicly thank the officials at NARCC, especially Bob Lanning and George Burton for their friendship and cooperation. I also wish to thank SCARA's Clark Murphy for his time during our candid conversations. And most importantly, I wish to thank all of you as members of SCRA for your patience and support during these difficult times. I am honored to have been elected as your President and having been entrusted with such great responsibility.



# Train, Train, Train

First of all, this is not an article written in favor of mass public transportation; it's also not a cry that the Chattanooga Choo Choo

is on its way through town (I think most of you caught on to that one!). I'm sure you've all heard of the old adage of the three most important selling points of real estate: location, Location, LOCATION! Now it's time to discuss the most important reasons to train before an emergency happens.

We train to become prepared because being prepared can reduce fear, anxiety, and the losses that accompany disasters. Communities, families, and individuals should know what to do in the event of a fire and where to seek shelter during a major storm or flood. They should be ready to evacuate their homes and take refuge in public shelters and know how to care for their basic needs. People also can mitigate the impact of disasters and sometimes avoid the danger completely. By training, you are taking the necessary steps to be ready when an event occurs.

My reasons for this article are not wholly unselfish. Initially, our first priority is to take care of ourselves and our family. If we are prepared enough to do that, we can then begin to think about helping the rest of our community; if we are not prepared enough we become a liability instead of an asset. Since I am tasked with supplying communications for our community in times of need, I have a great desire to have assets rather than liabilities at my disposal!

All of us, as part of our community, are part of a system that is all about protection - protecting people and property from all types of hazards. Think of this system as a pyramid with you forming the base of the structure. At this level, you have a responsibility to protect yourself and your family by knowing what to do before, during, and after an event.

Before an event, you need to know the risks and danger signs; you should develop plans for what to do, assemble a disaster supplies kit, and volunteer to help others. During an event, you need to put your plan into action, help others, and follow the advice and guidance of your training and those in charge. After an event, you need to repair damaged property and take steps to prevent or reduce future loss.

The second and third tiers of the pyramid are the local community and the state. This level is made up of paid employees and volunteers from the private and public sectors (is the acronym "ARES" ringing a bell here for any of you?). These individuals are engaged in preventing emergencies from happening and in being prepared to respond if something does occur. Most emergencies are handled at the local level, which puts a tremendous responsibility on the community for taking care of its citizens. If support and resources are needed beyond what the local level can provide, the community can request assistance from the state. The state also coordinates the plans of the various jurisdictions so that activities do not interfere or conflict with each other.

The system is built on shared responsibilities and active participation at all levels of the process. The whole system begins with you and your ability to follow good emergency management practices - whether at home, work, or other locations.

Of course, at the top of the pyramid is the federal government. I'm not going to get into a discussion about how the Feds can come to our aid when things get really bad ... instead, I'll just let you contemplate the aftermath of Hurricanes Katrina and Rita and let you come to your own conclusions!

So ... where is all this taking us? Sonoma County ARES has had a number of training sessions, most of which were centered on radio communication practices. We are about to begin a new series of training meetings that will also give you the tools you need to become personally prepared. We will be discussing natural hazards (floods, storms, earthquakes, fires, etc.), technological hazards (hazmat incidents and common chemical emergencies), terrorism issues (yes, there is a threat of national terrorism in Sonoma County), and ways to recover from disaster. We will talk about the personal supplies you need and how to keep food and water safe as well as precautions against infectious diseases. And, yes, we will also devote time to the development of a local communications plan and communications issues.

I plan to begin training meetings next month (July) and hold them at least every two months. They will be on Monday evenings and they will be designed to last no more than 1? - 2 hours long. The plan is somewhat aggressive but we will never accomplish it unless we start. I hope all ARES members and anyone interested in personal preparedness will join me.

The ARES net meets on Mondays at 7:30 pm on the SCRA repeater on 146,985MHz, - offset, 88.5PL. Members and guests are invited to check in anytime.


