Generator Basics

The weather will be changing soon and people will begin to plan for the recurring power outages

that happen each year. Each winter season hundreds of generators are purchased and not all of those decisions are the right ones.

If you choose to buy a generator, make sure you get one that is listed with the Underwriter's laboratory (UL) or Factory Mutual (FM). Look at the labels on lighting, appliances and equipment you plan to connect to the generator to determine the amount of power that will be needed to operate them. For lighting, the wattage of the light bulb indicates the power needed; appliances and equipment usually have labels indicating power requirements. Choose a generator that produces more power than will be drawn by the combination of the equipment you plan to connect to the generator including the initial surge when it is turned on. If your generator does not produce adequate power for all you needs, plan to stagger the operating times for various pieces of equipment; this is called "shedding loads". If your equipment draws more power than the generator can produce, you may blow a fuse on the generator or damage the connected equipment.

Follow the directions supplied with the generator. Under no circumstances should portable generators be used indoors or inside a garage. Adequate ventilation is necessary and proper refueling practices, as described in the owner's manual, must be followed. It is a good idea to install one or more Carbon Monoxide (CO) alarms inside your home. If CO gas from a generator enters your home and poses a health risk, the alarm will sound to warn you. Many fires and deaths from carbon monoxide poisoning have occurred from using a generator improperly. A Northeastern ice storm in January and February of 1997 shows that as many as 100 people were killed and 5,000 people injured by misuse of a generator at home.

Be sure to let the generator cool down before refueling. Store fuel for the generator in an approved safety can. Use the type of fuel recommended in the instructions or on the label of the generator. Store fuel outdoors in a on the label of the generator. Store fuel outdoors in a locked shed or other protected area. Do not store fuel in a garage, basement or anywhere inside a home as vapors can be released that may cause illness and are a potential fire or explosion hazard.

You should never hook up a generator directly to your home's wiring. The safest thing to do is connect the equipment you want to power directly to the outlets on the generator. There are several reasons why hooking up a generator to your home's electrical services is not a wise idea. Home-use (non-industrial) generators do not supply enough amperage to supply sufficient power for today's homes that require power for air conditioning, lighting, appliances and electronic equipment. Unless your home's power supply was installed with a disconnect (or transfer switch) to the main power feeding lines, power you put into your home from a generator could "backfeed" into the main grid and cause problems for the electrical utility company, your neighbors or yourself. "Backfeeding" is supplying electrical power from a power source at the residence into the incoming utility lines. This occurs when the necessary equipment used to isolate the generator from the incoming power lines is not installed. I guarantee that this will make your local power company extremely unhappy with you!

The National Electrical Code (NEC) does permit an interface between the normal power source (generally the electric utility) and an alternate power source (such as a standby or portable generator) provided that the proper transfer equipment that prevents "backfeeding" is used. Simply connecting a cord from the generator to a point on the permanent wiring system and "backfeeding" power is an unsafe method to supply a building during a utility outage. Improper connection methods not only endanger the building occupants, they pose a serious hazard to electric utility workers as well.

There are a number of products available that will provide either an automatic or manual transfer between two power sources in a manner prescribed by the NEC. When selecting a product for this function, it should be one that has been evaluated for safe performance by an organization such as Underwriter's Laboratories. The product must be installed according to the NEC and all applicable state and local codes and the manufacturer's instructions. Contact a qualified electrician if you are continued on page 5

top-band enthusiast who was only 15 at the time we began to write. He was interested in electronics, and went on to electronics school after finishing his normal schooling.

I wrote my first letter to him in January 1970, and received a reply a few months later. As I recall, Martin's English was not as polished as he would like, so his father helped him with the composition of the letters.

I'll never forget one of his letters from Yugoslavia when he and his family were on vacation. Since his home country was occupied by what was then the Soviet Union, every letter coming from the West was opened and examined. But in Yugoslavia, the mail was not censored. Apparently, conditions were so bad in Czechoslovakia back in the mid '70s that Martin wrote, "If someone does not do something soon, we will all be eating grass." His letter really gripped me, almost like reading a spy novel and hearing some secret information. Some people he knew were considering immigrating to another country, but apparently Martin's father did not want to leave.

Martin later married and sent me pictures of the wedding and his new bride. Later, we swapped pictures of our children, and I remember sending him a picture of me with my prized Vega long-neck 5 string banjo. You should have seen my long sideburns!

We often talked about working each other on the air, but somehow things just never worked out. We continued our correspondence, although in the '80s and '90s it slowed down to an occasional Christmas card or postcard every few years.

Mississippi Calling!

A few years ago, I decided to send Martin a coffee mug with a Mississippi logo on the side for a Christmas gift. That resulted in Martin's looking up my old ham call on the internet, WA5YOD, and locating my e-mail address and new vanity call, W5LEW.

Imagine my surprise three years ago when I received a great e-mail from Martin. We were back in touch! And my "international situation" had changed: my oldest daughter had married a fine young man from Germany whom she had met when she was there as an exchange student, and they were living in Germany. So now, I had a European "base of operations."

Martin and I begin to dream in our e-mails about meeting in the European Union one day. Finally, in the fall of 2005, I wrote Martin that my wife and I were traveling to Germany to check out our new granddaughter and to spend Christmas with Laurel and Burkhard, my daughter and son-in-law, and his family. I wondered if it would be possible for us to "hook up" while we were on the continent.


